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New York is in no danger of being replaced by Columbus as a fashion capital, but central **Ohio** does have its share of budding Calvin Kleins.

Meet Brian Peoples, 26, president of a small, mail-order clothing company called Image III. Peoples has visions of someday competing with such giants as Speigel, but what this self-proclaimed jack-of-all-trades believes he does best is design.

His fall ready-to-wear collections, for men and women, include trendy daywear, business classics and evening attire.

To support his design habit, Peoples works part time at a local textile company and delivers pizzas. Like many fashion designers, his interest in clothing construction stems from childhood.

"It's kind of a natural talent that evolved because my mom made all her clothing from her own patterns; my dad reupholstered furniture," said Peoples, who works out of his office/apartment.

"Once the business starts taking off, I'm hoping to get someone to help construct the clothing so I can focus primarily on design."

His inspiration: Italian design king Gianni Versace.

"His styling is more modern, which is what I like to get into."

Peoples' fabrics for fall include bridal satin and crepe; he's also keen on wool and wool blends for suit jackets.

While he's been fighting to get his business off the ground for almost eight years, participating in the upcoming **Ohio Black Expo** will be Peoples' first major fashion show in Columbus.

Traditionally, the finale for the **Expo** involves a fashion show extravaganza and dinner. Peoples will be one of nine designers in this year's show. Others are:
